

"Hmm," said Arizona. "What else could we use?"


"I know!" said Tex. "That modeling clay."


Why do I wear a coat in cold weather?







Blanket

Polar Bear



Before You Begin

Adult: Cut a triangular piece of cardboard for the head. The triangle base should be the same width as the cardboard tube. Then, cut a triangle from one end of the tube.



Paint the polar bear's head and let it dry. Cover the pre-cut tube with double-sided tape.



Unroll cotton balls. Stick them onto the tape-covered tube. Add a pompom tail.



Put a long string through the tube. Tie each end to a craft stick. Glue. two pieces of white yarn to the inside edges of the tube (for legs). Add pompom feet. Let dry.



Draw a face on the painted head. Glue on two pompom ears. Glue the head inside the tube.


